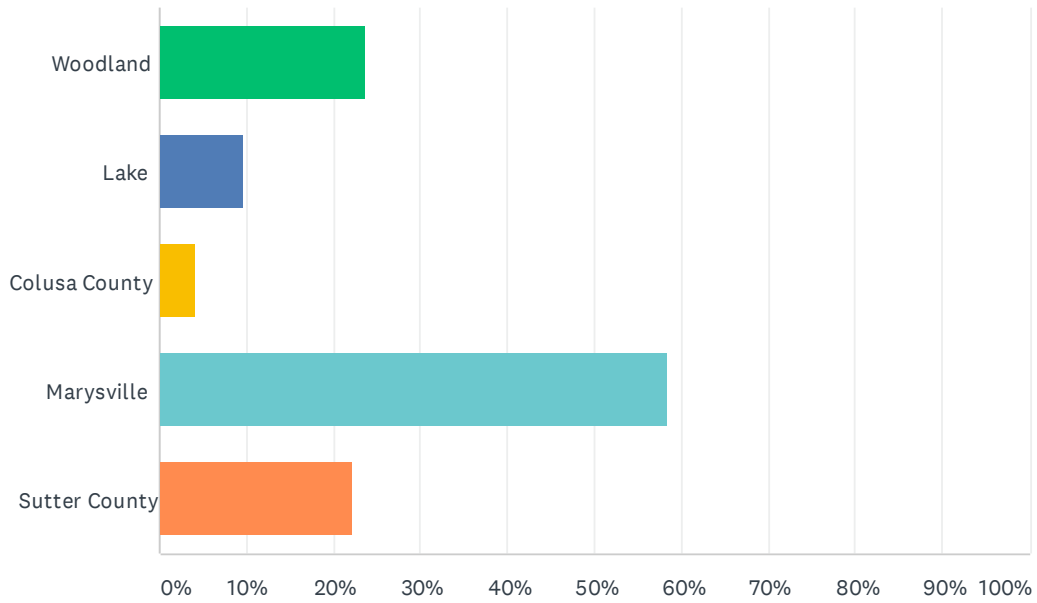


## Q2 Your primary worksite (check all that apply)

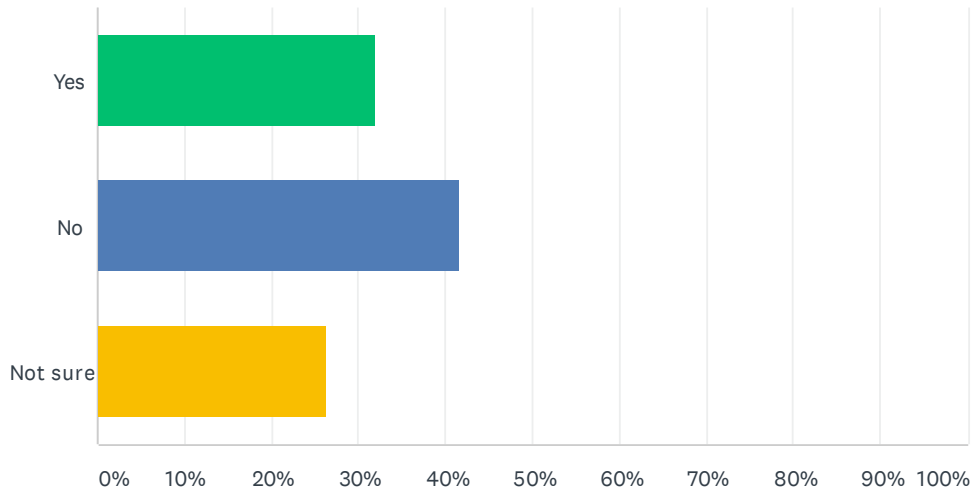

### Q3 Based on the information currently available to you, do you believe the college/District will be able to provide a safe working environment for face-to-face instruction and services in the summer?

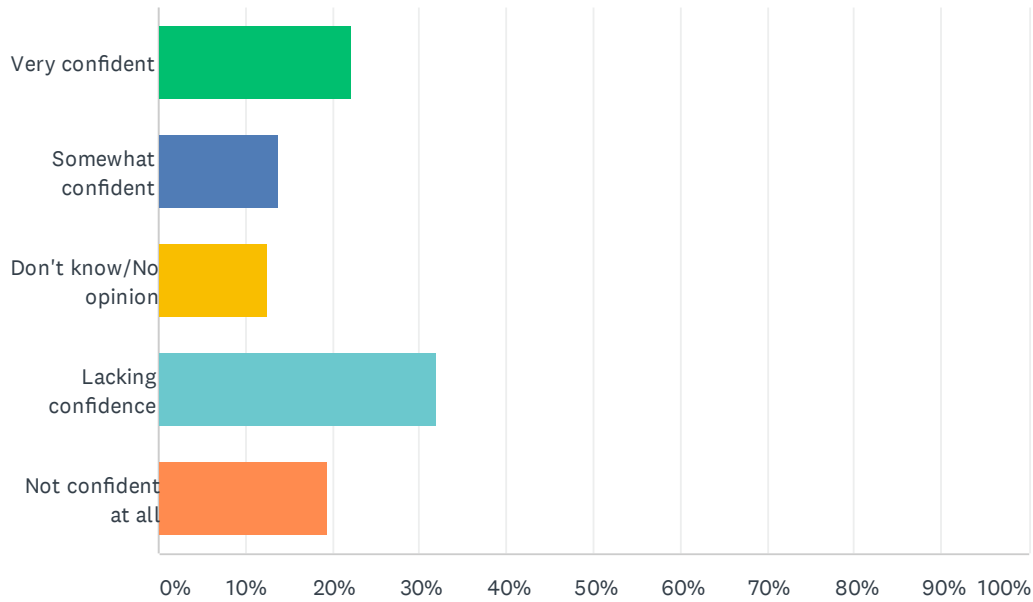

### Q4 How confident are you that the college/District will be able to provide employees with a safe working environment for face-to-face instruction and services in the summer?

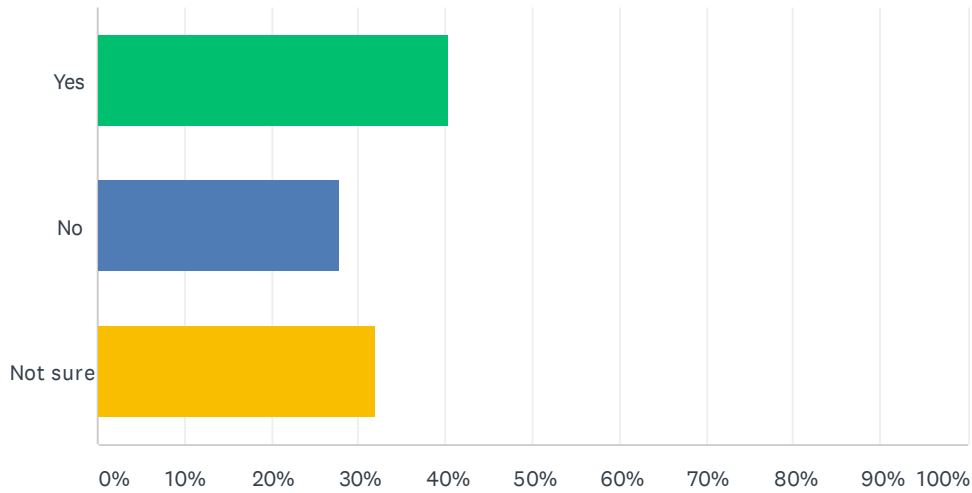

### Q5 Based on the information currently available to you, do you believe the college/District will be able to provide a safe working environment for face-to-face instruction and services in the fall?

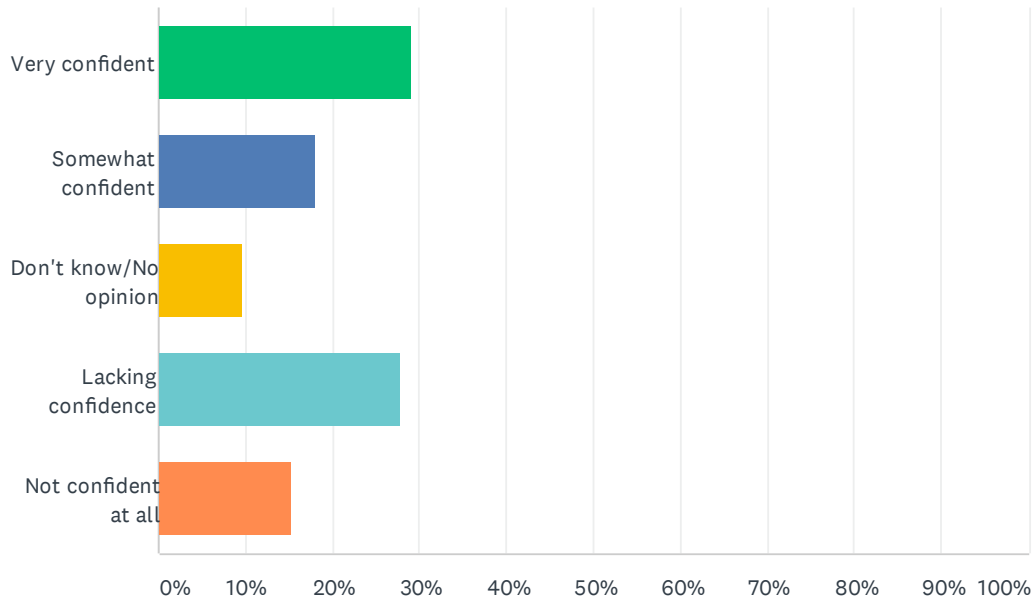

### Q6 How confident are you that the college/District will be able to provide employees with a safe working environment for face-to-face instruction and services in the fall?

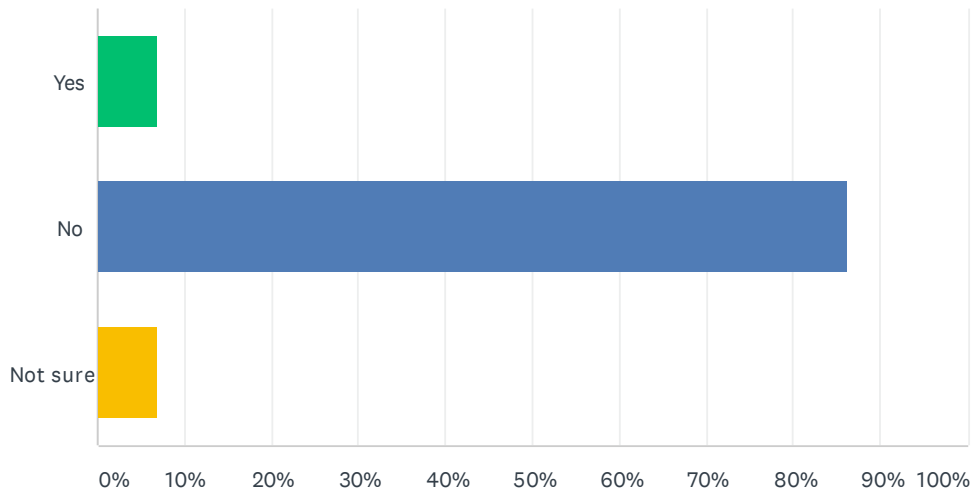

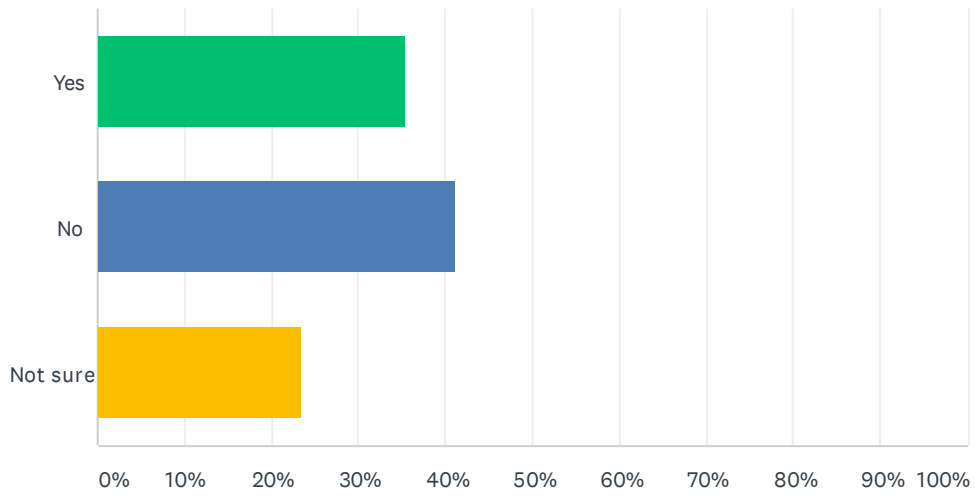

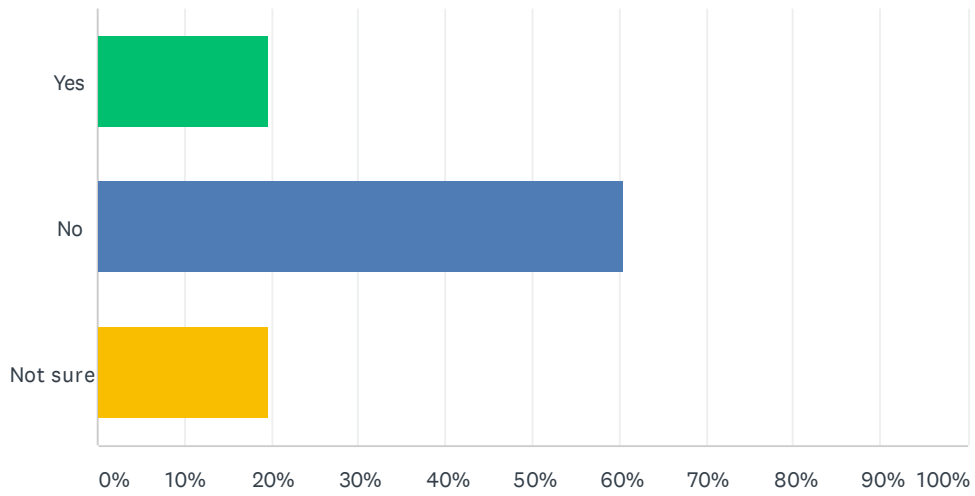

### Q10 Have you been provided adequate communication from the college/District regarding the plan for the fall semester?

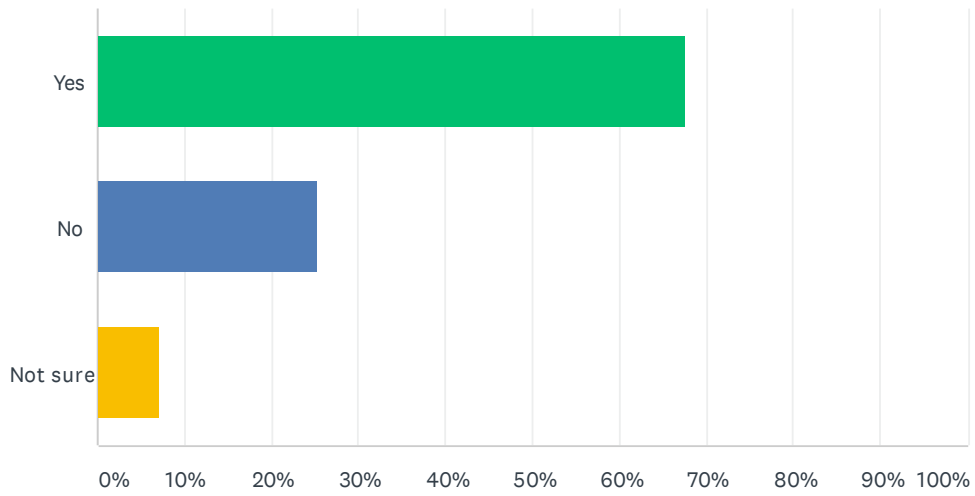

# Q11 Is it possible for all of your courses (or the services you provide) to be offered online?

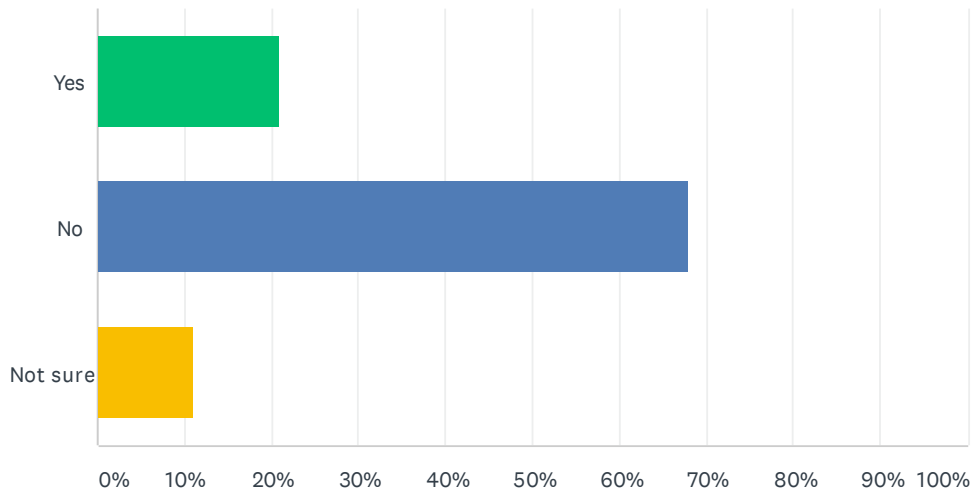
